Be Strong and Courageous! Joshua 1:9

Worship Theme: Choosing Our Ending...Finishing Well! Today's scripture texts: Isaiah 66:1-6

The key message of the sermon would be an encouragement for us to choose our ending wisely, like the humble who exalt God in all they do. There are two groups of worshippers in the house of God.

The God-exalting worship of God by the humble, vv1-2. The self-exalting worship of God by the arrogant, vv3-6.

When Christ comes, things will be so totally changed that His people will recognize the sheer size of God. The context is that we are not going to think of the physical temple as the dwelling place of God, like the Israelites. Think about the majesty of God! Heaven is God's throne. Earth is where God rests His feet. God cannot be localized or contained. Isaiah predicted the end of the temple and its worship. This is what Isaiah is saying. This is the new heavens and new earth when Christ comes. This is part of the new creation. The temple is not your hope. The new covenant will make all things new and the former things and ways and worship will be forgotten.

If temple worship would be set aside when Christ comes and establishes his covenant, what is the new worship going to look like? God explains this in verse 2. "But this is the one to whom I will look: he who is humble and contrite in spirit and trembles at my word." It is not people who come to the temple. It is people who come to the throne of God who lives in heaven, with humility. God will look with favour on those who come with a contrite spirit. God will accept people who tremble at His Word. God wants people who sense their inability in spiritual matters.

God examines the sinful hearts of the people and their problem. "These have chosen their own ways" (v3). The people delight in sin rather than in delighting in God. The self-exalting worshippers choose to do what God does not delight in (v4). When God calls through His word, they do not listen. Hence, God will judge them for their sins.

Pay attention to the encouragement God gives His God-exalting worshippers. God tells those who long to obey God to listen to what He has to say. Your brothers will hate you for trembling at His word. You will endure sarcasm, mockery, and shame because you love the scriptures. We may think that our suffering will be caused by outsiders and unbelievers. But this shame will be caused by those who claim to be followers of God. Verse 5 says that they are going to mock your love for God. In Isaiah 28, it is mentioned that such people will mock you because you are deeply concerned about God's Word. But the Lord will bring recompense on them for God knows they are his enemies (66:6).

May you celebrate being God's son and daughter. Choose your Ending as that will determine how you will finish well.

There is literally nothing else on my Twitter feed right now. Every single post has something to do with the situation that now plagues our world. It does not matter if it is politics, sports or pop culture – COVID-19 has penetrated into every sphere of existence. Even typing that name of that pandemic makes me cringe, as though naming it makes it more real.



This is the crisis of our generation. Hundreds of thousands lie down in self-isolation or hospital beds, wondering if every moment will be their last. And the rest of us remain gripped with the fear that we are next. Politicians and health officials scramble desperately to safeguard those whom they can, knowing that the tiniest slip up can have catastrophic consequences. Then why on earth is this happening?

How am I supposed to hold on to faith in a benevolent Healer who allows sickness to run rampant? How do I keep believing in a God of peace when fear, panic-buying and disruption of world economies and school schedules reign? Somehow the old slogans seem empty – just trust in God! Have more faith! God is good all the time, and all the time God is good!

Sure, say that to a world fighting for its life.

I am not seeing care packages delivered from Heaven by winged angels. I have not seen the heavens open and heard a voice saying "Enough!" What happened to the prayers of all the faithful, who petitioned the Great Physician to bring healing? If the prayers of righteous people are powerful and effective, where are the effects?

God, why are you silent?

Surely He Has Borne our Sorrows

You seemed silent too when your own Son died on the cross. When he wailed from the excruciating pain of his nails and the effort of every gulp of air, you said nothing. Eloi eloi lama sabachthani issued from his parched lips to meet with nothingness. No angelic host or miraculous sign to prove your presence and rescue your Only Begotten. No pillar of fire or cloud, no mighty rushing wind, no trembling of the earth – at least not until after it was too late.

And yet.

Somehow you were there. Clothed in our mortality, you felt it all. The sting of every wound, the breaking of every bone. The piercing of all flesh and the strain of every muscle. But you did not stop there. You bore the hurt of every heartbreak, the crushing weight of every separation and loss. You would not drive pain and sickness and death away, but took it all on yourself.

You did not suffer so that we would not have to suffer, because we still do. You suffered so that we would not be alone when we do suffer.

Surely he has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows; yet we esteemed him stricken, smitten by God and afflicted. But He was pierced for our transgressions; He was crushed for our iniquities; upon Him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with His wounds we are healed.


