

Discovering the Joy of a Clear Conscience - What's Really in Our Heart?

To illustrate our need for a changed heart in addition to changed behavior, author Christopher Ash uses the following illustration (or object lesson) based on David's sin with Bathsheba:

Suppose I hold a glass of water and I shake it. Water spills out, and you ask me, "Why did water spill out?" The instinctive answer is, "Water came out because you shook it." But there is another correct answer, which is, "Water came out because water is what was inside the glass. If there hadn't been water in the glass in the first place, no water would have ever come out of the glass." Sure, it came out because it was shaken, but water came out because water was inside.

So if we asked David, "Why did you do what you did?" He might say, "I did it because I was tempted, because of pressure. I was, as it were, shaken. My equilibrium was disturbed by outside influences, things that happened to me. I was weary. I looked out of the window and saw this beautiful woman, and one thing led to another. I was shaken." That's what we instinctively say. "I said that because I was stressed." "I did that because I was tired, or sick." "My upbringing has conditioned me to react that way."

But David's answer [see Psalm 51] is, "I committed adultery because there is adultery in my heart": "I covered up because there is pride in my heart"; "I murdered because love of self and hatred of others is in my heart." The really shocking thing I have discovered, says David, is that what I did expressed who I am. Evil came out of me because there is evil in me.



Wednesday Night Bible Class 2021

I Peter (The God of Hope in Hard Times)

IIPeter (Daring Faith)

Starts: 28 April 2021

Ends: 6 October 2021

Our current Wednesday night Bible class series on Leviticus will conclude on 21 April, 2021. We are grateful to all the teachers who have dedicated their time and resources to help teach this wonderful series to edify the church.

Beginning next Wednesday, 28 April 2021 we will start a new series based on the epistles of I & II Peter. We have lined up 24 exciting lessons to exhort and encourage the congregation. We pray that you will find time to study this new series with us and look forward to your participation.

Synopsis of I Peter:

Peter addressed this epistle to Christians living in the five Roman provinces of Asia Minor, located in modern-day Turkey (<u>1 Pe 1:1</u>). He wrote to strengthen and encourage them in the "trial of their faith" (<u>1 Pe 1:7</u>), prepare them for a future "fiery trial" (<u>1 Pe 4:12</u>) and teach them how to respond to persecutions as befitting those chosen of God (<u>1 Pe 2:19–23</u>; <u>3:14–15</u>; <u>4:13</u>).

Peter's counsel was very timely because the Church was about to enter a period of heightened persecution. Until approximately A.D. 64, the Roman government generally tolerated Christianity. In July of that year, a fire broke out and destroyed much of Rome. It was rumoured that Emperor Nero himself had ordered the fire to be started, and in an effort to divert blame for the disaster, some prominent Romans accused the Christians of starting the fire. This led to intense and widespread persecutions of Christians throughout the Roman Empire.

It was not easy to be a Christian during such a time and the Christians in modern-day Turkey need to know why they have to suffer. They need to know whether it is worthwhile to persevere in their faith, how to deal with these persecutions and how to conduct themselves in a hostile world.

The apostle Peter writes to address these issues in two ways:

- Testify the truth. The more they know about Jesus, themselves, and the world, the better they'll
 - understand their difficult situation.
- Exhort them to persevere in trials and conduct themselves as befitting those chosen of God.

The epistle reflects this focus. Peter explores a doctrine, and then encourages the Christians to apply it to their lives.

1. Christians are different in that they are "aliens," or residential foreigners to the Roman Empire (1 Pe 1:1, 17). We shouldn't expect to be treated differently until our King claims dominion forever and ever (1 Pe 5:10–11).

2. Christians are different, we are a spiritual house, a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for God's own possession (<u>1 Pe 2:5, 9</u>). Therefore, Christians ought to keep their behaviour excellent, so that even their oppressors will glorify God.

3. Jesus sets the finest example of suffering to glorify God? Peter indicated that when the Saints "suffer as a Christian" (<u>1 Pe 4:16</u>), they can rejoice knowing that they are following in the footsteps of Jesus Christ (see <u>1 Pe 2:19–23; 3:15–18;</u> <u>4:12–19</u>).

4. Suffering tests us. It's a way that we identify with Christ. And it never gives us an excuse to sin but the suffering Christian will still do what is right (<u>1 Pe 4:19</u>).

To Peter, suffering is something the Christian should always see coming. Every chapter in I Peter speaks of trials or suffering, and Peter taught that patiently enduring trials is "more precious than ... gold" and would help believers gain "the salvation of their souls" (<u>1 Pe 1:7, 9</u>).

The great theme of this epistle is the Christian hope in times of trial and suffering. Hope is made possible because of the Atonement of Jesus Christ, so that we can faithfully endure and respond to suffering and persecution.

In the midst of the affliction and persecution faced by the Saints of his time, Peter exhorted them to turn to one another in love and tenderness for support and strength (<u>1 Pe 1:22; 3:8–9</u>). Furthermore, Peter exhorted that Church leaders could play a crucial role to strengthen and encourage their congregations in such difficult times (I Pe 5).

The church is one family, and a family is made up of people across different age groups and life stages. At PP, we are blessed with a growing number of babies and children! Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." (Matt 19:14). We are deeply encouraged by all the parents and teachers who are persevering in training up our children in the way of the Lord.

At the same time, as more families start coming back, we are also mindful about maintaining an environment that is conducive for quietening our hearts to approach God in worship.

In particular, during the combined worship service, we urge all members to demonstrate a spirit of thoughtfulness and graciousness towards others. Philippians 2:3-4 says: "In humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of others".

For all members, we ask for your graciousness and patience if there are unexpected sounds that children may make during worship service.

For parents, if your children are fussing or need your attention, we seek your cooperation to step out with them until they calm down and are ready to enter the worship hall quietly. The church has also made available a live streaming of the worship service in the Chinese congregation hall as an alternative venue for additional seating capacity.

Transitioning from worshipping in the peace and quiet of one's home, to gathering in church with a larger group of members, is a big change for all. We ask for every member's patience as we navigate this period together.
